RECORDING GENEALOGICAL DATES (a reminder on the best way to record dates comes from the November 2007 Family Tree Magazine, at FamilyTreeMagazine.com) Keep dates in your genealogical research accurate by recording them exactly as you found them in source documents. Next to that, write any conversions in square brackets (such as from the Julian to the Gregorian calendar), along with the tool used. If a date is uncertain, use abbreviations such as *bef* for before, *aft* for after or *bet* for between. On your genealogical charts, write dates European-style in long form: 23 February 1887. See the [November 2007 Family Tree Magazine](#) for more "dating" advise.

Interment.net contains thousands of transcriptions of cemetery records and tombstone inscriptions, from cemeteries in the USA, Canada, England, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, and other countries. Access is free-no subscription fees, no money.

PENNSYLVANIA ARCHIVES ONLINE The complete set of published Pennsylvania Archives is now available on line and may be freely searched or images downloaded from www.footnote.com. You will need to register your email address and have a password. This site has many other databases available at this site for a fee, but the archives books, 132 volumes, are available at no cost.

LULU <http://www.lulu.com> Have you ever wished you could listen to genealogy lectures without having to travel across the country to genealogy conferences? Lulu.com is a lifesaver. Here you'll find audio files of hundreds of lectures given at Federation of Genealogy Societies conferences, downloadable to your computer for, usually, \$1.99 US a piece. As attending the conference can cost you hundreds of dollars, these files are a real bargain. To find genealogy lectures type "FGS" in the keyword search.

MORE GENEALOGY PARTNERSHIPS Ever since several new genealogy business relationships emerged during May's [National Genealogical Society](#) conference, companies have been declaring unions right and left. UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON HISTORICAL DOUCUMENTS DATABASE If you are doing research on early settlers of the Pacific Northwest you will want to check out the digital collections of the University of Washington Libraries at <http://content.lib.washington.edu/index.html>. The advanced search link at the top of the home page is a great entry point to all of the collections. Insert the name of a person or a place and see what is offered. The collection list itself does not give enough information, but the search engine quickly covers the material attached to each photograph and manuscript. MORE HISTORIC NEWSPAPERS ONLINE In March 2007 the Library of Congress and the national Endowment for Humanities announced the online versions of public domain newspapers from California, Florida, Kentucky, and several other states between 1900 and 1910. www.loc.gov/chroniclingamerica/ can be searched in the Chronicling America site. More than 226,000 pages have been added to the newspaper database. Access to the site is free. Information from *The Forum*, October 2007, via the *Bulletin* of the Clallam County GS Winter 2007.

WA STATE COST FOR VITAL RECORDS UP Announcement was made in July that the fees for certified copies of birth, death, marriage or divorce certificates from the state Department of Health will be \$20 for each copy beginning July 22. (2007). Genealogists sometimes require certified copies to authenticate their facts. Birth certified records are necessary to get a drivers license, certify a will and get a passport, as well as to receive Social Security benefits. The state legislature allowed the fee increases to help state and local governments meet increasing costs for providing the services. *Bulletin* of the Clallam County GS Winter 2007.

GOOGLE BOOKS Google.com is in the process of putting thousands of books online. If you have not tried it recently, go to Google and type in a family name. If they have anything online it will come up, including scanned pages of books as well as books for sale that may have information you are looking for. www.germangenealogygroup/Military.stm New York Military Naturalization Project Database covers WWI, WWII, and Korea telling those who applied for citizenship while stationed on military camps in NY and discharges. You can search by surname or soundex.

www.passengerlists.de Bremen, Germany passenger lists from 1920-1939 may be searched by surname, ship name, departure date, destination harbor, and hometown of passenger.

CANADA

www.bifhsgo.ca The Home Children Database (orphans from British Isles to Canada 1869-1924) and The Middlemore Project (Middlemore Homes in England 1872-1900) "Barando Children" from the magazine "Ups & Downs" (Toronto 1869-1924). These are on going projects so check back for new information to be posted.

www.oldbaileyonline.org "Old Bailey Proceedings" a London publication renowned for its accuracy summarizes cases and proceedings. These have been put into a database by the University of Sheffield for the years 1674-18334. Searches may be done by keyword – surname, place, crime, verdict and punishment.

www.news.nnyln.net Northern New York Historical Newspapers from 1842-2004, various area papers. Index for each newspaper. This is an on going project, changing constantly.

IRISH OF MASSACHUETTS, PROVIDENCE, RHODE ISLAND

www.tiara.ie The Irish Ancestral Research Association is creating a database of the MCOF/Foresters Mortuary Records. These are life insurance policies of holders who died 1880-1930. The entries should be of interest to those have the above stated ancestry. At present only the index is available. This is an on going project looking for volunteers.



The Lewis County Historical Museum Library has an extensive collection of Lewis County materials, including newspaper obituaries, family histories, photos, and early newspapers. Ask the museum director or librarians for help.
